In a bid to commemorate the government of Sierra Leone's call to Free Quality Education, Education Cures has launched a Young Mothers program to resume their schooling.

Education Cures takes the challenge and continues to empower teachers in schools in developing countries by expanding beyond its usual activities with the Kindergarten and Primary Students in the Sierra Leone International Mission School campus to include programs for young mothers.

We launched the Young Mothers Brainjogging Program on March 9, 2022. This program provides Free Quality Education to bring young mothers back to school and helps improve their cognitive processing speed, upgrade their knowledge from previous course levels, and foster their knowledge about computing.

The Young Mothers Program is the first of its kind in Sierra Leone.

- ▶ Students engage in 4 days of learning sessions each week.
- ▶ Each session lasts for 2 hours a day.
- ▶ Brainjogging completed twice each session using the National Curriculum to promote effective learning.
- ▶ Learning Microsoft Software Packages for vital employment skill building.
